


I especially enjoy international travel - land tours and cruises; golfing;

My Job Title is Associate Director, DMACC Foundation.


My hobbies are biking and spending time with friends and family

People are surprised to learn that I


lived in Berlin, Germany for a year when I was 19."



Submitted by: Carroll Bennett - Ankeny, IA

- 1. When did you begin work at DMACC? June 1967
- 2. When did you retire or leave DMACC? July 2006
- 3. In the early years, what was your work position and major responsibilities? Assistant Director of Vo-Tech Education. My duties included assisting the Vo-Tech Director in program development, recruiting and interviewing faculty, conducting staff development, and recruiting students. I had primary responsibility for developing unique training programs for businesses and making presentations to education and community groups.
- 4. What events or happenings to you remember most about your first years at DMACC? The quick and positive response to the new college by students, their families and the community. The rapid growth in enrollment and the increase in new programs (in 5 years we had 40 programs). The building of new facilities (all programs were initially housed in temporary facilities in several locations for the first two years).
- 5. What major changes did you observe during your time at DMACC? I watched the college grow from 30 students in three programs to 20,000 in 70 programs, and expand from one campus to 5, with several attendance centers. The relationships with high schools improved when college credit courses were made available on their sites, as did

the respect that senior colleges showed through articulation agreements that recognized our strong academic program. The college gained recognition as an institution for first choice and developed an outstanding reputation nationally with unique programming and the talents of the faculty.

6. Who do you remember the most from DMACC and why?

Our outstanding first Superintendent/President Dr. Paul Lowery, who developed the mission and basis for later success. Dr. Phil Langerman who set the tone with strong off campus programs and later became the CAO. Leonard Bengtson who developed student services and a reporting system that were the envy of other colleges. Own Shadle 1st vo tech director, Dr. Bob Eicher built vo tech. Jack Asby our first CFO. All faculty and staff, and many board members.

7. Please share any other special memories you have about the early years at DMACC. It was exciting to be one of the first college employees and to be a part of most of the major development efforts for my 30 years. I was given latitude to try new ideas and to participate as a leader in state and national professional organizations. I had many mentors who encouraged me to take risks and think big. I will always be grateful for the opportunities and the personal satisfaction I have gained from DMACC.

As one of the very first employees, Shirley has had a long and successful career at DMACC – 36 years to be exact. She was among a small number of faculty members who were a part of DMACC's first instructional team in the fall of 1967, the first year classes were offered. Shirley had a long and successful career as program chair of the Medical Assisting program – a program that was, in thanks to her, among the first to be accredited – both nationally, and at DMACC. She also was active in related activities and served as president of the lowa Vocational Association and later as a Regional Vice President and board member for the American Vocational Association.



She has been active in a variety of roles as a DMACC Pioneer that culminated with her election as President of the organization from 2014 to 2016. She has been invaluable in driving DMACC to new heights by providing volunteer support, generous financial support, and irreplaceable insight.

LITTLE KNOWN FACTS & GREAT ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

In her own words: "With my husband John, raising 3 kids while working full time! Developing the Medical Assistant curriculum. There were no Programs in Iowa until the Area Schools were established. Drs. had to be convinced our graduated could be more efficient than training staff on the job. Our program was one of the first in the nation to be approved by the American Medical Association. We presented testimony to the House Committee of Education and Labor in 1981. When we started at DMACC we were a small group. We knew everybody and depended on each other for support. Long-lasting friendships developed, still very close to those I worked with. I don't know if that still happens hope so! Sharon Eskstrom and I became "Sisters of the Heart" (Note: Sharon was the first recipient of the Outstanding Pioneer of The Year in 2008. Also, since we were there at the beginning, we developed and designed our space in the building. That was another new experience. I don't think I ever worked so hard in my life.

I appreciated the support from administration when I got involved with American Vocational Association and Iowa Vocational Association. It was another "growth" I could not have participated in without their support and the support of my family.

SPECIAL MEMORIES: On my 50th birthday, my students tied me in a wheel chair, went on a campus tour.

At a party at my house, had a race on a kid's tricycle and a toy John Deere Tractor. Quite a sight!

We used a mobile trailer for typing classes and the mice invaded in the fall. Lots of squealing students.

I love Pioneers because it helps me stay in contact with DMACC friends, remain involved in activities that benefit DMACC and especially students, and raising money for scholarships for students."

JOAN ADAMS • 1930-2017

Joan Adams passed peacefully on Thursday, September 14, 2017 at Mercy Hospice in Johnston. She was born November 20, 1930 to Charles and Gertrude Forney in East Beaversburg, PA. She grew up on the family farm in rural Pennsylvania where she learned to love outdoor life, plants and animals. She started her working life at age 15 at a candy store in Lancaster. After graduating from East Hempfield High School, she attended Elizabethtown College for one year before she learned that nursing was her true calling. She trained at the Osteopathic College in Philadelphia, PA, then began her career as nurse on the Seaboard Express, a passenger train that ran between New York and Miami. Following that she worked as a hotel nurse in Cleveland and San Francisco. Eventually, she returned

to Philadelphia, where she married Dr. Jay Adams and worked in his pediatric practice as his nurse. In the late 1950's they moved to Des Moines. Jo worked as a psychiatric nurse at Hillcrest Hospital, which is now Scottish Rite Park, the retirement high rise where Jo lived most recently. When Hillcrest closed, she became the head of nursing at lowa Lutheran Hospital. She earned her Masters' degree at Goddard College and went on to teach nursing at DMAAC until she retired in 1993.

Early in the 1970's, Jo was introduced to Healing Touch, a practice she learned to love and willingly shared. She was a gifted healer, as well as a hypnotist, helping hundreds of patients, students and friends over the years. Jo loved learning. She was always interested in the latest developments and anything new that could improve people's health and sense of well-being. She had a special passion Samoyed dogs and told stories about her favorite pet, Soul Brother.


LLOYD MILLER • 1938-2017

Teacher and musician, Lloyd J. Miller, 78, died on July 18, 2017 in Des Moines, Iowa.

An abundantly curious, deeply-principled, optimistic, generous soul, Lloyd lived and loved his life fully. He especially enjoyed riding his motorcycle, traveling to the Southwest and national parks, gambling in Las Vegas, fishing and camping, passionately debating politics,

celebrating special occasions with family, and spending time with close friends.



Lloyd served in the Navy then attended the University of Wisconsin where he received a Bachelors then a Masters in Ibero-American studies. He taught Spanish and anthropology at Kankakee Community College in Illinois (1968-70), and Des Moines Area Community College (1970-2000), spending eight years as DMACC's director of social and behavioral sciences division (1974-82).

He conducted various tours of Mexico, culminating in 1989 in what he deemed "the educational highlight of my career": a Fulbright-Hayes Group Studies Abroad grant in conjunction with the University of Naucalpan, Des Moines' sister city, guiding seventeen teachers on a six-week educational tour of Mexico. Of twenty-one selections in The Tao of Anthropology (2008), his "The Accidental Anthropologist" was the only submission written by a community college professor.

From the age of fifteen, Lloyd was a professional saxophonist and clarinetist. Belonging to the American Federation of Musicians, Local 75, he performed jazz, classical, and big band dance for over forty years throughout central lowa.

He is survived by his children: Sam Miller, Laura Sparks (George Sparks); stepchildren: Erin Drinnin (Jason Jones), Joel Drinnin (Amanda Drinnin); grandchildren: Nathan, Toby, Mabyn, Jade, Beatrice, and Owen; and companion: Mary Beth Wilk. 
